

Killcare lost a giant of the club on Friday June 27, 2025

The Annand name is writ large in the history of Killcare SLSC, and none more so than Noel Annand.

Pillow fighting was a central part of surf sports until 1979 and it was hard to imagine just how big it was. At Aussies people would walk away from the boats and the sprints to catch the finals. Pillow fighting champs were lauded and there were few better than Noel with one hand clinging to his speedos, a pillow in the other, straddling the pole 5 or so feet off the sand. Noel was Australian Champion in 1974 and 1976, with a career tally of 4 golds and 2 silvers, pictured above sending Ocean Beach sprint Champ Peter Quick to the sand in a local carnival and about to show Copa what for.

Above all Noel was a devoted clubman, a great life saver, Club Captain in the 1975/76 and 1977/78 seasons, a tireless servant of the movement and a great mate to many.

Our sincere condolences to Noel's family and many, many friends.

Vale Rosalie Nowland

In March we lost a very active member of the club through the 1950's, Rose Nowland.

It's hard to fathom these days but then women weren't allowed to be full members and instead were part of the Ladies Auxiliary, where Rose was very prominent. Craig Sheppard, President, Killcare Surf Club:

Beach safety for 2023 / 2024 season has gone well.

We would like to pay tribute to the following people:

Makayla Redman steps down as Co-Junior Club Captain and we thank Makayla for all her work in this role.

Nic Urie steps down as VP of Club and House and his roles on the Committee. Nic has done work in various roles for the club and we thank him for his time and commitment with deep appreciation.

Thank you to the Killcare Surf Life Saving Club Board and Committee for the immense amount of work throughout the season and year.

Welcome to Kristian Peacocke as the Director for Junior Activities appointed by the Killcare Surf Life Saving Club Board and the role is up for re-election in the AGM 2025. Thanks to our sponsors and supporters including major sponsor Belle Property, Central Coast Council, the NSW State Government and the Commonwealth Government supporting surf lifesaving and Killcare Surf Life Saving Club.

Surf Life Saving Central Coast gave a one-off grant of \$8,000 branch grant to each of the 15 clubs under their banner which will be used for operational, nippers and training equipment.

Surf Life Saving NSW surprised with a \$1,000,000 cost of living support package distributed amongst all NSW clubs. At Killcare this will be used directly on the membership - all patrollers, age managers and office bearers both at committee and sub-committee level will have complementary membership for 2024/2025 and a reserve will be kept for any hardship requests for nipper membership.

Thank you, Surf Life Saving Central Coast and Central Coast Council, for the great initiative in putting rescue tubes in strategically placed locations all over the Coast, with the focus on unpatrolled spots. Our stretch of beach has two already in place with more to come.

Therese Buckley, Director of Finance, Killcare Surf Club:

The 2023/2024 season was another successful year for Killcare Surf Life Saving Club.

This financial year produced a surplus of \$55,532 from ordinary activities, a turnaround from the slight deficit of \$5,082 last season.

The committee has continued to focus on maintaining and improving the club facilities for all club members and the local community. One main area was the upgrading of the club gym which was only made possible with a very generous donation from a local family.

Grants received during the 2023/2024 financial year include:

WHY ON EARTH DO WE INDULGE IN SUCH A WEIRD HOBBY?

It's easy, particularly towards the end of the season when we're all a bit weary, to wonder why we give up so much time in what amounts to one of the more crazy hobbies you could imagine.

Story time.

We were contacted in May by a gentleman by the name of Trevor Herd who, at 87, is getting his affairs in order and was considering a bequest to the club, which happens from time to time. He asked for some newsletters to get a feel for us and what we're up to and some past annual reports presumably to check that we're well governed. That's fine, we're an open book, these were all provided and we had a lovely back and forward over email. The bequest when it comes, which we hope will be a long way off, will be specifically earmarked for the purchase of lifesaving equipment and will be consequential.

Mr Herd has led a happy and distinguished life; a family, General Manager of Woolworths Victoria, Life Governor of the Royal Children's Hospital in Melbourne and Life Member of the Maroochydore Surf Club amongst his achievements.

We're incredibly grateful of course but particularly with that last honour in mind, it begs the question, *why Killcare*?

He told us his tale. 70 years ago, in 1955 when he was just 17, he was swimming at Killcare on a Friday afternoon. A bank collapsed and 10 swimmers were dragged out. 8 of them made it back under their own steam but Trevor and his mate weren't able to.

On the beach was a clubbie, not on duty, he had just finished work and was relaxing before weekend duties.








Since he had keys to the club, he quickly grabbed the reel. As there were no other trained life savers around he roped in some of the beachgoers with some quick instruction on what he needed them to do, putting his safe return in their hands. He strapped in and hit the water. He swam out but was only able to grab one of the lads at a time. The rescuer told Trevor and his friend that he may not have the strength to make it back out again. Trevor was pretty athletic with tennis amongst his sports, so he backed his leg strength and elected to stay behind. Eventually of course the life saver did come back, bringing Trevor back to the beach.

It's a pretty familiar story that plays out regularly to this day.

Any chance, he asked, of tracking down any information on his rescuer? Well Peter Harbison has been doing some work recently on our history and has spent a lot time talking to some of the stalwarts like Lex Cameron and John 'JB' Bourne. We got Pete into the conversation, but Trevor didn't give us a whole lot to go on. It rang some bells for Pete, he looked through his notes and thought it was enough to narrow it down to a couple of possibilities.

Of the two possibilities, Trevor had the name Adam in mind all these years which narrowed it right down and we found our man.

Sadly Adrian is no longer with us.

Pete wondered about something else and asked some subtle questions when we was swimming with a mate one morning.

His hunch was right and that's why we introduce Adrian to almost everyone - it turns out Adrian's son David is one of the Frigid Digits who got his bronze with us just last season and has been a fixture on patrol since.

The yarn gets better; we put David in touch with Trevor and they had a lengthy conversation. The Murphy family used to own the Brisbane Water Ferry, virtually made redundant with the opening of the Rip Bridge. After the demise of the ferry, they went to Port Moresby in Papua New Guinea for business opportunities. In the course of conversation, David mentioned that passage of their life and it turns out Trevor and his wife were in Port Moresby at the same time and they had actually crossed paths, albeit loosely.

A great tale, but what's the point?

Trevor fully credits his last 70 years to the actions of Adrian Murphy on that day. As far as he's concerned, everything he's done and enjoyed for the last 70 years, Adrian made possible.

Every Easter since they have made a generous donation and send us some very



kind thoughts because as far as they are concerned, and these are Venkat's words, the club and particularly these 3 legends are responsible for them being alive and giving them and their children a future.

We rarely hear from those we help and we can't stress enough that it's not about the money, that's just the way they choose to show their gratitude. Particularly in Venkat's case, we ask first and foremost that he take the surf safety message to his community in Sydney's West, which he assures us he does.

We guarantee that every single person you help, whether we hear from them or not, will sometimes think "what if..." and get that shiver of what could have been had you not been there, trained and ready to execute.

Possibly not as profoundly life altering only because they usually don't know what we do and can't foresee the ramifications, but every preventative, where you stopped someone barrelling down from the car park about to jump straight into a rip, you helped yourself by not requiring a rescue and putting yourself in danger as well, but you also gave them whatever lies ahead.

That's why we do what we do.

When you stop someone getting into trouble or pluck them out of trouble, you're not just sending them home. You are making possible whatever they go on to do with the rest of their life.

Rich or poor, famous or humble, they are significant to someone. Whether you are on the beach or behind the scenes making sure we can be on the beach in the first place, you make that possible.

Be proud that we do what we do.

Rescue Water Craft have been a fixture for some years however their brief is broad and complex; they are responsible for great swathes of coastline, must be very highly qualified and experienced and go through long and arduous training.

For some years we've been lobbying to offer RWC training to our members with a local focus - patrolling only our beach. In June, thanks to the dedicated work of the SLSCC Lifesaving Team, this became a reality with a State-first course at Killcare.

The 2025/26 Season will see a RWC on every patrol covering incidents within our response area. They are another arrow in our quiver and offer yet another pathway for our members.



We were thrilled to take out the award for Innovation of the Year at the Surf Life Saving Central Coast Awards of Excellence.

We didn't invent flexible patrolling, full credit for that goes to Bermagui SLSC, however we were able to take it to a new level with a streamlined implementation that makes it much easier for the patrollers to roster themselves and much easier for our lifesaving team to monitor and administer.

It's a credit to the club and all our people that we were able to take the leap of faith and try something new and untested.

We have a saying that you'll prise our club cap out of our cold, dead hands but when it's all said and done our colours are red and yellow. With that in mind, it's been especially pleasing to be able to offer our system to other clubs around the state.

We now progress to the NSW Surf Life Saving Awards of Excellence on August 16.

It came about by talking to the right people and being in the right place at the right time but Killcare had two new additions to out tech arsenal.


One is a partnership with Surfline and SLSNSW placing an AI camera that is able to count the number of people on the beach, distinguish between surfcraft users and swimmers, inside and outside the flags and more.

The other is a surfcam that is part of the global Surfline network of cameras, meaning anyone can check the conditions at the beach from anywhere in the world.

Both will be invaluable in deploying our resources more effectively and efficiently and for incident review and planning.





While pleasing to see small gains toward gender equity, more must be done to attract females, particularly amongst patrollers.





CRAIG SHEPPARD

I don't have words for the pride we all take in the community we've built not just amongst the people who represent the Killcare cap but our neighbouring clubs and clubs further afield.

Not everyone sees everything of course but we have great relationships with all 15 Central Coast clubs from The Lakes in the North to Umina in the South. We have particularly strong relationships with our neighbours, Copa, Macs and OB.

We've gone further afield and can count Kiama, Wauchope-Bonnie Hills, Camden Haven, Woolgoolga, Shellharbour, Bermagui, Bulli and Forster surf clubs amongst our direct friendships. You've probably heard me say before that you'll prise the Killy Cap out of my cold dead hands but when it's all said and done we're united under the red and yellow.

We're part of something much bigger and it's truly amazing what happens when we come together, from the all-in nippers day with Macs and Copa which we'll be hosting this season through to critical incidents like North Avoca on Christmas Eve and the Entrance Channel before that. To know that a call to triple 0 can see jet skis, SMAR swimmers, expert commanders and UAV's, all volunteers as well as Lifesaver 21, Toll, police rescue and all other agencies come together and do what we're trained to do makes you incredibly proud to be part of this organisation.

I'm constantly in awe of our team, everything we do, the skills we've acquired and continue to develop. While we love our broader lifesaving community nothing is more important than the local community we serve and of course our little Killcare family.

The aligned strategic plans of clubs, through branches, states and SLSA has a mission built on three pillars - We save lives, create great Australians and build better communities.

Our core mission is and always will be making sure everyone who comes to Killy on our watch goes home again. Amongst another tragic year for drownings we, and it must be said every Surf Life Saving club in the state, achieved that once again.

Officially it's 17 but the records this season are a bit sketchy, we believe it's actually closer to 25 or more people that our patrollers pulled out of harms way this season. Some of those most certainly would not have made it home if not for our efforts.

And who knows about the more than 500 people - and I reckon it was double or even triple that - that our team asked, in the nicest possible way, to please not be a wally and do what you're about to do.

That's what we exist for.

To be able to execute, all our patrollers must of course be trained in the first place and reprove their skills every year. Education is one of the most complex portfolios in any club and we could not be more grateful to our Director of Education Stephen Pearson. Every season he continues to gift us more bronzies and other awards and is absolutely key to our ongoing viability. Assisted by Scott Leivesley, John Cvetko and Jo Bramble,





the education team have had their job made more complex than in the past with more members, new rules and FlexiPatrol breaking down the team structure. But still they delivered.

It's been a landmark year in how we do what we do and to everyone, thank you for persisting with the big experiment that is FlexiPatrol. My particular thanks to Director of Lifesaving Kurt Vella for his immense amount of work in not just getting it up and running but keeping it going through the season. It has and will continue to pay dividends.

One of the highlights of the year was FlexiPatrol being awarded Innovation of the Year at the SLS Central Coast Awards of Excellence, and as such is now nominated for the same category at State level. Discussions with State and others indicate that this is the way of the future and we're the ones figuring it out and writing the rules on how it'll work. We didn't invent flexible patrolling, credit to Bermagui SLSC for that, but we made it more workable and SLSNSW particularly is grateful to our team for being the guinea pigs and giving it a crack.

With no fixed teams, this season has also seen a lot more taking on the mantle of patrol captain, ones who have the qualification but never had a team to call their own. It's no small thing to put your hand up to be prepared to potentially take full responsibility for a critical incident and make sure everyone knows their job and executes it. We are grateful to them all.

I would also like to mention one of the stalwarts of the club that often goes unsung. Under the auspices of Sports Chaplaincy Australia we've been lucky to have Stephen Hinks in the capacity of Club Chaplain for many years. Stephen is a great sounding board, pops into most patrols to see how we're doing and with specific trauma training is a vital resource in incident response. Stephen is retiring as pastor of the local church however we hope he will be able to continue his work with us.

To make any of our work on the beach happen, we have to run a pretty substantial business with more oversight than most, both from government regulators and up through the SLS chain. That's on our admin team of Sarah Gutierrez, Jill Williams and led by Therese Buckley. Not everyone would know that every year we, and every club, get audited by SLSNSW who go over our financials, statutory and regulatory compliance and release some funding based on that. Most of that falls on Therese and she's kept such a consistently clean sheet over such a long period that this year they told us that they're only going to look at us every three years from now on which is a huge vote of confidence.

The second plank of our mission is that we create great Australians. There's no greater demonstration of that tenet than nippers. Sure, we had a glorious run of conditions, but without organisation, without people recruited, trained and deployed all you can do is stare at the ocean thinking of how good it could have been rather than how good it was. To all our Age Managers, Water Safety and helpers who made that program possible, thank you.

The final part of our mission is that we build better communities.

Sips is looked forward to by our whole community whether they are involved in the club or not. When you come to sips and all the social events, the people behind the bar are giving their time to keep the register pinging which helps keep us in the gear we need. We thank all our volunteer bar staff, but special mention to Mal and Corrine Williams who have really gone above and beyond this year.

Probably no one exemplifies building better communities than Sue Fraser. She does her best everyday with the Sisyphean task of keeping the club free of sand but more importantly organises all the social activities the club holds. From Sunday Sips, to band nights, comedy nights, dance nights and on it goes. This is something we have been advocating for for some years and we are indebted to the team at Surf Life Saving Central Coast, particularly the DoL Gordon 'Smudge' Smith who pushed through a number of hurdles to make it happen, along with Shaun Gersch, Dave Smith and all the trainers who have come from near and far. With this in place, we anticipate every patrol will now have an RWC.

We hope to also see UAV's as a feature of our operations in the upcoming season. In fact I have taken on the role of Branch Manager of UAV's not just for our benefit but to assist other clubs in introducing this exciting new technology.

We look forward to our 94th season with the flags up on September 27. Thanks again to all our members for their contributions.

director of lifesaving

It has been another amazing season with so many achievements by our patrolling members.

This season was of significance as Killcare Surf Life Saving Club has introduced a flexible self-scheduling model for its patrol roster that empowers each volunteer to choose when they want to patrol.

Recognising the evolving landscape of volunteerism, the club has moved away from the traditional model of being placed on a team and rigid rosters published months in advance.

Instead, patrollers can now indicate their availability, allowing for a more adaptable approach to scheduling that aligns with their personal commitments.

Many of our dedicated volunteers are eager to contribute but struggle with the longterm commitment of a fixed roster, by allowing patrollers to self-schedule, we're not only accommodating their needs but also enhancing our overall operational efficiency. By outing our volunteers first by moving from us telling them when they're on to them telling us when they can contribute.

The new approach, a concept pioneered by Bermagui Surf Life Saving Club, ensures that the club can maintain a strong presence on the beach while fostering a sense of ownership among volunteers. Patrollers can now take control of their schedules.

This new patrol roster system had significant benefits and was very well received and contributed to the return of many past members and attracting new members.

I see great value in building upon the lessons learned from trialling FlexiPatrol last season. Next season will look to make further developments to enhance the flexible arrangements whilst maintaining a core strong patrol culture of leadership, mentoring and sense of "tribe" whilst maintaining options for those who can commit to a fixed schedule.

The FlexiPatrol arrangement moved away from traditional patrol teams and therefore rostered team were fluid each weekend.

Furthermore our new Lifesaving agreement introduced a variance of positive change that were a byproduct of the statistics we keep state wide. To reflect the beachgoer population demands patrolling times were adjusted to match the low patronage shoulder period of the season which avoided patrols having to mobilise during times will little to no people on the beach. And protocols introduce to enable patrol number to be adjusted to reflect the demand of the beach due to inclement weather and low patronage. This was very well received and appreciated.

Our statistics this season are as follows, however i am sure there were many more preventatives than actually recorded that enabled our rescues to be minimised. Yet again it shows how much work we have all put into the club this season.





Here are the official statistics for 2024/25 however it must be noted that due to some record keeping anomalies we believe some of them to be inaccurate.

+212.5% Rescues	2023/24 - 8 2024/25 - 17*

better than a guess. A new initiative now in place is an Al camera in conjunction with SLSNSW and Surfline which will enable highly accurate statistics in 2025/26

GOING FORWARD

Recruit more Bronzes and Surf Rescue Certificate - The Community Day didn't deliver anyone this year and the numbers came from the Frigid Digits. They are a fantastic group including three returning patrollers. Building on the adult SRCs is a strong source of candidates. Many inquiries flounder due to the lack of confidence in their swimming ability. We need to be smarter in assisting candidates through that initial 'Am I up to it 'phase.

Reguals - The lack of distinct Patrols with flexi-patrol hurt as the team aspect of regualling was lost. It takes a significant amount of my time September to December every weekend from October. December is a ridiculously pressured time. Having said all of this we achieved good results with a above average reguals across awards.

SLSA are making this process increasingly hard and unless the patroller is highly motivated and driven the regual won't happen. For the average patroller it is a confused and convoluted process.

Fourteen new SRCs over the season and given we achieved none the previous season this is really good. Majority were adults and six from the Nippers parents group. This was a significant investment in time but amply rewarded in seeing

Working closely and getting great support from other Clubs especially Umina,



As a small Club we just don't have the resources to support the average patroller. For example we need Board training in September as this is one of the skills that degrade quickly.

Patrol Captain reguals are being introduced by stealth. It would be better to offer a sensible training structure for new Patrol Captains and I believe this feedback has been heard.

SRC to BM -The SRC stream coming through to BM is very important to the club to maintain patrols numbers and ability. They are also just an awesome group of great teenagers and a real credit to the Club. Unfortunately, SLSA have completely stuffed up the transition process and paperwork. So, we will have to put them through a full Bronze to overcome this impact.

IRB - Really hard getting this to happen and still a strong dependency on other Clubs. We went backwards in this critical area despite the best efforts of John Cevtko.

First Aid – First Aid requirements are continually moving and changing. All we could do is to keep up and we did. No significant new numbers but those who needed to regual did so.

Other awards and training – We successfully ran a 'Remote First Aid 'course in July 2024. Less successful was the Mental Health course with insufficient numbers.

COMMENTARY

For a small Club we have achieve great results due to the commitment of our trainers and members.

We have more trainers but due to issues beyond our control I am still the only consistently available trainer. That has made a difference. In as much as training of candidates the need for a paperwork guru is critical. SLSA is deeply bureaucratic organisation. The club must have someone across the continual changes and nuances that make training a success or frankly a nightmare.

I still think we are too small a Club to sustain a full training function. I believe that there should be better co-ordination across the Clubs and training should have several Clubs participating and co-ordinated by Branch. I realise this means some independence will have to be lost but our focus must be on our core mission.

Training compliance and requirements are continually changing. The paperwork requirements are particularly onerous. To keep ahead of the changes in awards is a significant effort alone.

New technology and better software is promised by SLSA. The Assessors app finally is viable for larger Clubs but unfortunately is too overly structured as a tool to create time for me.

As with last year and finishing on a positive note if I have made even the smallest of contributions to skilling up or supporting our patrollers I have been amply rewarded.



Notes To The Financial Statements For The Financial Year Ended 30 April 2025

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies 1.

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009, the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012, the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and associated regulations. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Killcare Surf Life Saving Club Incorporated is an association registered under the Associations Incorporations Act 2009 and domiciled in New South Wales.

The financial report is prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

These are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purpose of complying with the Australian Charites and Not-for-profits Commissions Act 2012 and associated regulations. The Executive Committee have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members of the Killcare Surf Life Saving Club Limited.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the AASB and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements'; AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows'; AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors'; AASB 1048 'Interpretations of Standards'; AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures' as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

Accounting Policies

Revenue

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Association and the revenue can be reliably measured.

Sale of goods

Sale of goods revenue is recognised at the point of sale, which is when the customer takes receipt of the goods, the risks and rewards are transferred to the customer and there is a valid sales contract. Amounts disclosed as revenue are net of sales returns and discounts.

Functions and Events

Revenue from functions and events are recognised once the event is held in the Club facilities and has met its obligations to provide a venue for the expressed purpose agreed with the parties. The receipts and deposits take are treated as deferring functions and events revenue liabilities until the events is completed.

Membership fees

Revenue from membership fees is recognised at time of receipt.

Grants and donations

Grant & donation income is recognised as revenue when received unless they are designated for a specific purpose, where they are carried forward as prepaid income on the balance sheet.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Plant and Equipment / Surf Patrol Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised in the profit or loss as revaluation decreases if the impairment losses relate to the revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, including buildings and capitalised lease assets is depreciated on a straight line or diminishing-value basis over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease of the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

Class of Fixed Asset

Plant and Equipment Surf Patrol & Sports Equipment

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at end of each reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included in other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.
